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

Pastor's Morsels And Tidbits

Notes on the Scripture

The Pharisee and the tax collector—polar opposites by practice. The one is a religious leader, a professional follower-of-the-law. The other is a deviant who extorts money for himself as he goes about his economic business. But in today's parable, Jesus flips these perceptions around. While the Pharisee may keep the letter of the law, he is not truly converted to God's ways in his heart. The tax collector, on the other hand, pleads for God's mercy, recognizing that he needs it.

So, which one are we? Honestly, most of us are probably a combination of these two character types. Most of us follow God's laws some of the time, and fail to do so at other times. But the important point is to honestly acknowledge when we do fail, and to ask God to have mercy upon us. We should humble ourselves by honestly examining our conscience (regularly!) and seeking God's forgiveness, particularly through reconciliation, the great sacrament of divine mercy. This humble act of acknowledging our failings prepares us to be "justified" like the tax collector who cried out, "Be merciful to me, a sinner!"

Stewardship

This weekend we celebrate stewardship and present our financial report to the parish, but stewardship is more than just finances. A healthy Stewardship spirituality leads us to practice two key virtues: gratitude and generosity. Being grateful helps us to keep God at the center of our lives. Giving thanks to God reminds us that all that we have is God's gift. Generosity flows from gratitude. Gratitude enables us to recognize the blessings of God.

In the spirit of stewardship I invite you to consider joining one of many ministries at SFA. If you are able, please, share your gifts and talents with us. Thank you for your support and love for this wonderful community of ours. Please, review our report in the bulletin and keep in mind that our full report is being mailed this week to all active parishioners. Our 2015 Parish Financial/Stewardship Report

Dear Parishioners:

We wish to thank all of you who have given your time, talent and treasure to support our parish throughout the year. We are pleased to present this report for fiscal year ending June 30, 2016. It represents our commitment to fiscal transparency and the responsible stewardship of the resources you provided.

The good news is that throughout the financial crisis and slow economic recovery, due to your generosity, our parish continues to be in a strong financial condition. Christmas and Easter collections were at near record levels and our total income, including Sunday collections, ended the year at \$1.7 million. We currently maintain adequate cash reserves to meet both planned and unplanned maintenance and rehabilitation projects.

Parish expenses are watched closely by our Pastor and have remained slightly below our total income level providing a modest net income for the parish. However, a portion of our income is from the *To Teach Who Christ Is Campaign* (TTWCI) which restricts the use of these funds. As you may recall, last year all parishioners were asked to make a five year pledge to the Archdiocese's TTWCI Campaign in order to help meet several parish needs—our Religious Education Center mortgage reduction, roof repairs, a new sound system—as well as to help schools in the Archdiocese which are in desperate financial condition. The restricted funds we received in FY2016 from the TTWCI Campaign total \$178 thousand. Of this amount, \$146 thousand will be used in FY2017, and had this amount been deferred until used, we would have been in a net loss for FY2016.

Unfortunately, our Religious Education enrollment and mass attendance continue to decline. Over the past ten years we have seen a more than 35% reduction in children participating in the program (from 1,400 to 900 students). This decline in enrollment resulted in the parish subsidizing the Religious Education program by \$93 thousand in FY2016. These negative trends hold true across the country. If we are to continue to be a vibrant and active parish, we must remain self-reliant and have sufficient funds to cover our financial obligations. Our reserves can't fall below the level we have set aside to fund unexpected building repairs and other emergencies. Although our parish is positioned for future growth, contrary to many other parishes in the Archdiocese, maintaining our solid financial position relies on the generosity of our parishioners.

We acknowledge the trust that you place in us and commit ourselves to maintain our credibility with you. Again, we thank you for your past support and all of the sacrifices you make on behalf of St. Francis of Assisi Parish. Your contributions have enabled our parish to remain a bright beacon of the Catholic faith.

Adult Faith Formation

I'M GLAD YOU ASKED THAT QUESTION by, Sue Flanagan

Why is mercy killing wrong? Why does a terminal patient have to go through extraordinary measures to prolong her life?

Your first question refers to euthanasia which is an act or an omission that puts an end to the life of a handicapped, sick, or dying person. It is often called mercy killing because the intent is to eliminate suffering. The intention may be good but the act is still murder which is morally unacceptable. CCC2277

Your second question depends on your definition of extraordinary measures. Even if death is imminent, ordinary care owed to any sick person (fluids, food, etc.) must be continued. Palliative care is special treatment that provides relief from symptoms and the stress of severe illness. Palliative care is encouraged. CCC2279

"Discontinuing medical procedures that are burdensome, dangerous, extraordinary or disproportionate to the expected outcome can be legitimate; it is the refusal of 'over-zealous treat-

ment.'" In discontinuing these types of treatments the intention is not to cause death. It is just accepting the outcome of the disease. CCC2278

Medical decisions should be made by the patient as long as she is able. If the patient is not competent then the person who is legally entitled to act for the patient should make the decisions. The patient's interests should always be respected. This is why everyone should have a medical power of

attorney.

SAINTS OF MERCY

St. Boniface I
Boniface was ordained by Pope Damasius I. He was a priest at Rome and served as papal legate to Constantinople under Innocent I. When Pope Zosmius died in December, 418, a majority elected Boniface pope, and a minority elected Eulalius pope. Pope and anti-pope were consecrated on the same day. The Council of Spoleto was convoked in 419 to settle the dispute. Symma-

chus, the prefect, supported Eulalius, and the Emperor Honorius supported Boniface, who was enthroned after the Council. Boniface condemned Pelagianism and encouraged St. Augustine to write against it. When Boniface died in, 422, he was buried in a chapel which he had built in the cemetery of St. Felicity.

St. Oda

Oda was a French princess and the wife of the Duke of Aquitaine. She became a widow and servant of the poor. St. Oda committed her life to helping and aiding the poor.

AROUND FOR A WHILE

When I began sharing some thoughts a few weeks ago. I said I would not write about the election; but recently I read an article in America magazine (a bi-monthly Jesuit magazine) and thought it worth sharing.

We all have opinions about the candidates. I am annoyed when those running frequently campaign on the premise "I am not a politician". By the very fact you are running for office, you are a politician – but you need to be a good one. A good politician is one who both works for his constituents and works cooperatively with those who disagree. I am frustrated with politicians who are unwilling to do the later. Political leadership must be more than partisan leadership.

This is from the America article, "In the 1990's political scientists were concerned that real time media coverage, the introduction of the internet and increasingly negative po-

litical campaigns would polarize and discourage citizen participation." The book, "**Going Negative**" predicted much of what we witness today, writing that 'negative campaigning' "makes the public disenchanted with both candidates. The electorate may curse a plague on both houses. Negative campaigning may diminish the power of civic duty and may undermine the legitimacy of the entire electorate process. Campaigns that generate more nega-

tive than positive images may leave voters embittered".

No question, this is a negative campaign. However, like it or not, only one person will win and become our leader. Our country has always had a peaceful transfer of power. No matter how disillusioned or how much we disagree, after the election we must work as one nation. We need good politicians to bring us together.




